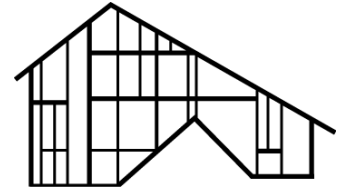

### “Is War Ever Justified?”

*Rev. Roger Fritts*

In 1969 I told the Phoenix, Arizona, draft board that, for religious reasons, I was "conscientiously opposed to participation in war in any form." What have I learned in 40 years? The sermon will be a lead-in to the theologian Paul Rasor's Kiplinger Address, Saturday, November 21.

**10:10 Forum:** *Action in Montgomery* (AIM) is a multi-racial, multi-faith, nonpartisan County-wide citizens' organization that seeks to build a base of power so citizens can influence the institutions that affect them. Cedar Lane UU Church is a supporting member. Alisa Glassman, AIM's lead organizer, sums up the organization's leading principles, describes its strategies, and tallies some recent victories.

**Music Notes:** Our music for today reflects aversion to war and the call of peace. As the Call to Worship, the Adult Choir sings, *Come, Children of Tomorrow* to the familiar hymn tune "Vom Himmel Hoch" harmonized by the renaissance master, Hans Leo Hassler (you may follow along on hymn

#110).

The Offertory features a new meditative composition by American composer, Frank Ticheli who is professor of composition at The University of Southern California. Respected in both the instrumental and choral world, Ticheli has received commissions from as far away as Australia and as close as the Prince George's Philharmonic. The brief work holds out music as a soothing balm during earthly trials.

Our centering hymn, *Meditation on Breathing*, composed by Sara Dan Jones, was featured at the GA conference in 2009. The Ad Hoc Choir has sung this hymn and the CLUUC Congregation is in the process of learning it.

Haydn's *Dona Nobis Pacem* was composed as the final movement in his traditional mass, "Harmoniemassee No. 14 in B flat." The mass was the last he would write, close to the end of his life. This setting of *Dona Nobis Pacem* "grant us peace") is extremely quick and vigorous, with the sopranos required to hit a high B flat just before the ending.

## From the Ministers

### Rev. Roger Fritts

Thursday, November 5, I joined a group from several local congregations who (like us) are members of Action In Montgomery County (AIM) to go down to Capitol Hill. We met with congressman Chris Van Hollen to encourage him to continue to support allowing undocumented workers the right to buy (with their own money) Health Care Insurance in the new "Health Care Insurance Exchange" created by the House Health Care Bill.

AIM is part of the Industrial Areas Foundation, which was created by Saul Alinsky. Alinsky's first organizing project was the Back of the Yards Neighborhood Council, founded in 1939 as the Packinghouse Workers union was organizing Chicago's meatpacking industry. I am guessing that because of its roots, Industrial Areas Foundation organizers tend to have an "us" (the workers) versus "them" (the owners) confrontational approach.

Often this tough aggressive approach gets results. However, it is a style of human interaction that I almost never use. So we had a sort of good cop, bad cop meeting with Congressman Van Hollen. AIM staff took a hard line. They aggressively said, we are watching you congressman, your constituents are watching you, and we want you to promise in writing that you will not trade away the right of undocumented workers to buy, with their own money, insurance in the new Health Care Insurance Exchange.

I took the good cop approach. I said thank you for meeting with us. We all are on the same

side on this issue. We are here because we want to support you to stick to the position you have already taken. We want you to be able to go into meetings and say you have heard from people in your district and this is important to them.

Chris said "If it comes down to one vote, and we can pass the Health Care Bill only if we give in and amend the bill to prohibit undocumented workers from buying insurance through the exchange, do you want me to give in, or stick by your position and see the whole bill fail?"

There was silence. Finally, one of us said. "Passing the bill is more important, but we don't want you to give in until the last moment, and only if absolutely necessary."

Two days later the House bill passed by two votes. In it undocumented workers have the right to buy (with their own money) insurance in the Health Care Insurance Exchange. However, the probation is in the proposed Senate bill and may be in the final bill.

As we left the Capitol I thought of Van Jones' 2008 speech to the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly. He said: "Y'all are about to mess up and be successful. Protest and critique of injustice is about to be replaced by a new challenge: *Prepare to govern.*" In other words, in the past we learned how to be confrontational and aggressive. But when the person in power basically agrees with us, other interpersonal skills are also useful.

The Social Justice Council received a very impressive presentation from HUI, a local nonprofit organization which is celebrating its 15th year of operation. HUI's mission is to provide independent housing and community integration for very low income adults with psychiatric disabilities in Montgomery County. The focus of HUI is to promote the self-sufficiency and independence of its tenants and to remove the stigma often associated with their illness.

HUI's facilities are located in all parts of the County and currently serve 123 persons in 41 apartments, townhouses, and single-family homes. All the units are convenient to public transportation, retail shops, and employment. Despite the tough economy, HUI acquired five new homes this year.
