Happy 2019! I'm always reluctant to make New Year's resolutions because they invariably involve difficult changes. However, I recently read the following by Klaus Schwab "Change can be frightening and the temptation is to resist it. But change almost always provides opportunities to learn new things, to rethink tired processes and to improve the way we work." So this year I decided on a small change. I'm going to try something new at Cedar Lane. There are a myriad of short and long term opportunities to learn and help at our church. Two in particular have come to my attention. First is Beloved Conversations. The Beloved Conversations curricula will give participants a chance to examine how to work for a more racially just world--both in our congregation and beyond. It will begin with a retreat on Friday January 18th. From 6:00 P.M to 9:30 P.M. and continue January 19th from 9:00 A.M. to 4:45 P.M. Then there will be eight 2 hour sessions every other week of small groups meeting to deepen the meaning of the beloved community. Second, there is the new round of Soul Matters groups beginning this month. Participants meet monthly in small groups and share ideas around a given theme. It is a great way to connect with others in a church as large as ours. January's theme is "possibilities." Contact Reverend Katie for Beloved Conversations, and Tim Atkins for Soul Matters groups. I'm not sure what my "something new" will be, but I'm enjoying the investigation.
